

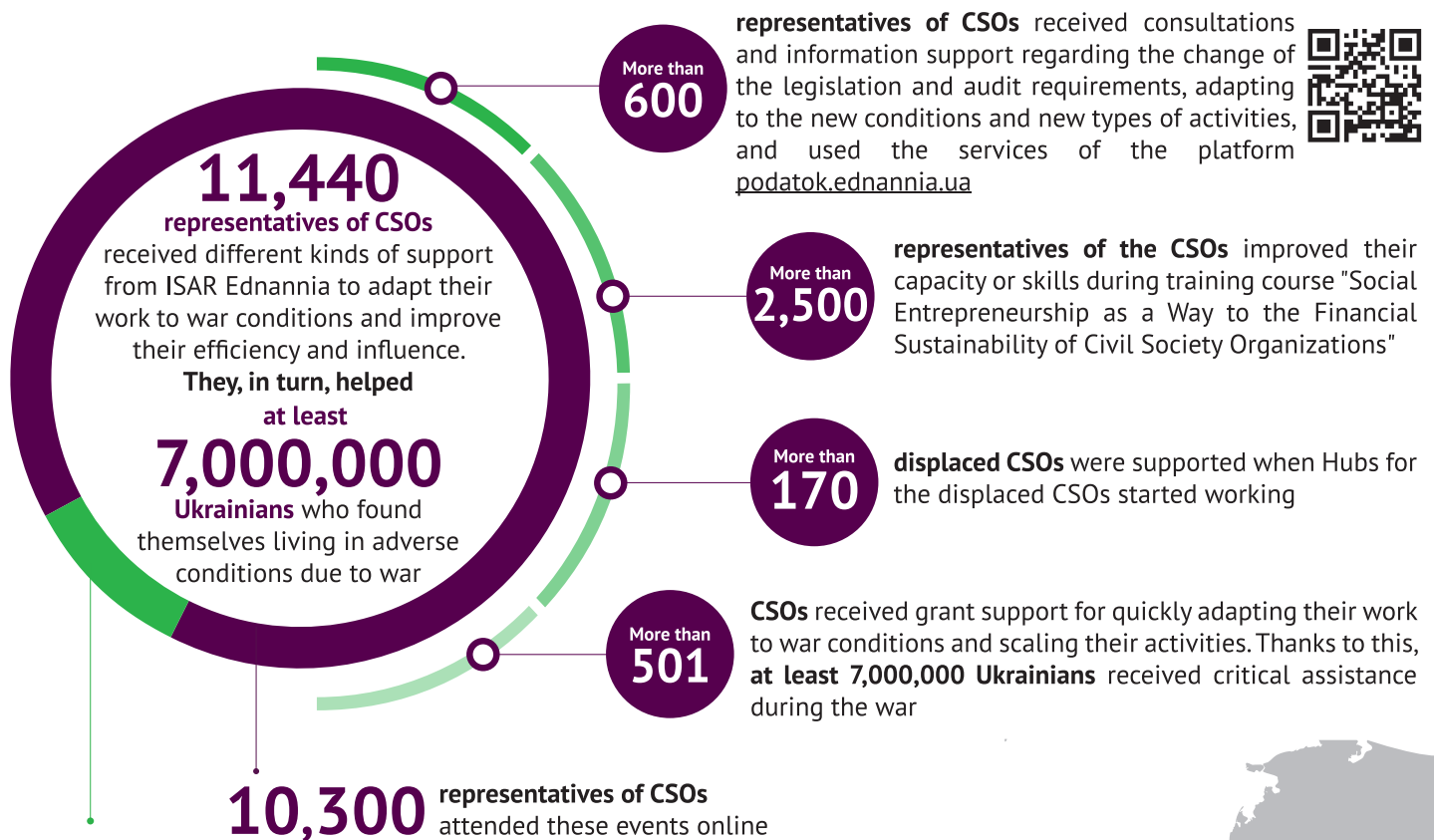


2022 ISAR Ednannia in numbers and events



In 2022 ISAR Ednannia continued to implement its mission, supporting civil society organizations and improving the environment of functioning of civil society.

ISAR Ednannia has been working for 24 years as a Ukrainian civil society organization and for 30 years as an initiative developing the capacities of civil society organizations. Each year we provide financial assistance to 400-500 non-profit organizations from all oblasts of Ukraine, that are improving the quality of life of people. We study the environment of functioning of civil society and charitable organizations and advocate for changes.



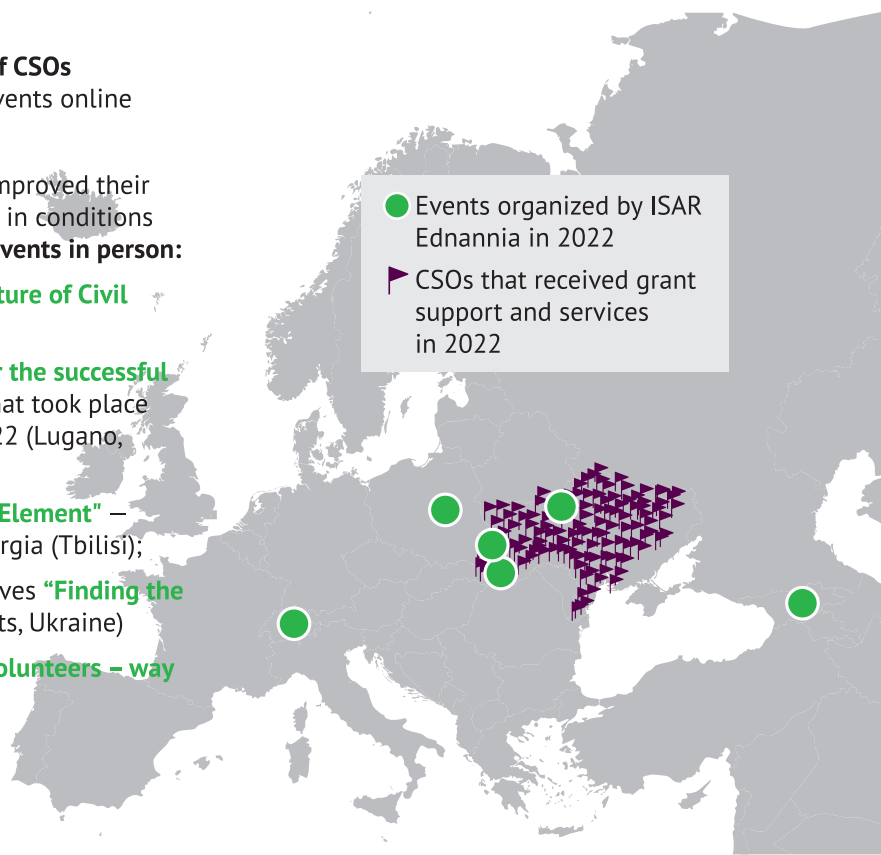

EVENTS

Conducted 6 events¹ (in Ukraine, Poland, Switzerland, and Georgia) with the participation of CSOs, international partners, national and local authorities and media representatives. **More than 11,400 participants** attended these events in person and **10,300 – online**.

International conference "War Aftermath: Reconsidering the Future of Civil Society"

Participants discussed the challenges of the war, and coordinated our actions; **150 participants**, **106 speakers**, **28 panel sessions**; **5,100 online views** of the live broadcasts.

"Summit of the volunteer and humanitarian initiatives"

180 participants, **90 speakers**, **12 activities**, **500 online views** of the discussion recordings.

Interactive session "Civil Society Navigator"

Together with the sector leaders, we worked on the navigator for civil society for different scenarios of development of events in Ukraine. You can get acquainted with the results of the work here.



XI Annual Civil Society Development Forum "Core Element" (Ukraine and Georgia)

650 participants offline and **3,000 – online**. **70 speakers**, **4 simultaneous locations**, **7 panel discussions**, **8 workshops**, and **11 exhibitions** of social enterprises – all of these strengthened the CSOs and inspired them to continue working towards victory.

Educational press conference for the journalists "War Aftermath: Reconsidering the Future of Civil Society"

Educational press conference for international and Ukrainian journalists, **2 media discussions** in an online format, webinar conducted by a CNN journalist. **28 publications** in media.

September

Side-event "Paving the way for the successful and inclusive process of restoration of Ukraine"

took place as part of Ukraine Recovery Conference (URC 2022) in Lugano, Switzerland. The involvement of the sector in the restoration and modernization of Ukraine was discussed. **100 participants**, **25 speakers**, **3 panel discussions**, **1,700 online views**.

December

Volunteer summit "Armed Forces of Ukraine and volunteers – way of the undefeated"

120 participants, **32 speakers**, and **4 panel discussions**. The event gathered representatives of the government, members of the parliament, representatives of the General Staff of the Armed Forces of Ukraine and the Ministry of Defense of Ukraine, and leaders of the volunteer and charitable initiatives from all regions of Ukraine, to coordinate their efforts.

RESEARCH AND EXPANDING PARTNERSHIPS

From the first days of the war, ISAR Ednannia analyzed the needs of the civil society sector (conducted 2 studies) and expanded partnerships for sectoral support. Apart from the funding from **US Agency for International Development, European Union, Charles Stewart Mott Foundation, UNDP, IZ (Austria), and ICNL**, during this year, ISAR Ednannia's programs were financed by the **Embassy of the United States of America in Ukraine, Black Sea Trust for Regional Cooperation, project "Strengthening Public Trust" (UCBI III), financed by the US Agency for International Development (USAID)**.

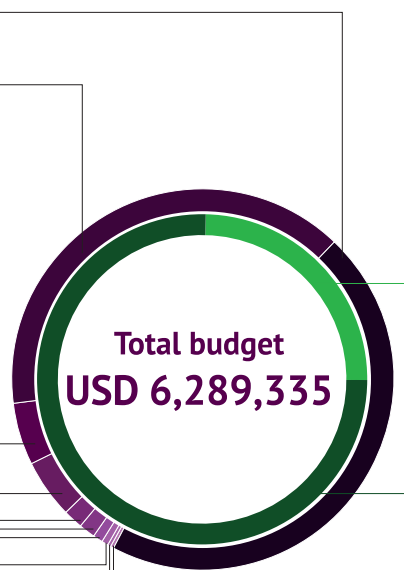

INTERNATIONAL FUNDRAISING

For the first time, ISAR Ednannia launched a campaign to attract funds from individual donors from abroad, "PEOPLE FOR PEOPLE: The World Saves Ukrainian Communities", to support the viability of Ukrainian communities in conditions of war. It was possible to attract **USD 324,268.73** and redistribute almost all the raised funds through a grant competition to improve the sustainability of communities. **56** CSOs from the most affected communities of Ukraine received assistance.

ADVOCACY

Together with partners², **advocated for adopting of 2 laws on volunteering** to improve regulation and exempt taxes for volunteer expenses. These and other initiatives to improve the operating environment of the civil society sector were successful due to the development of partnerships with state and local authorities, in particular the **Office of the President, the Office of the First Lady, the Ministry of Youth and Sports, the Ministry of Social Policy, Kyiv, Lviv, and other city administrations.**

CONSULTATIONS

Provided support to over **600 CSOs** that received training on conducting activities and accounting in connection with new changes in legislation in wartime conditions.

6

GRANTS

Financed **501 projects** of civil society organizations and charitable foundations, which in turn provided direct assistance to **7,000,000 Ukrainians**. This allowed CSOs not only to respond to challenges quickly but also to increase their capacity and efficiency during the war.

From the first days of the war, ISAR Ednannia started supporting CSOs through the grant competition "Emergency capacity support for civil society of Ukraine to act in extraordinary circumstances". During the first month of the war, ISAR Ednannia supported the projects of 70 CSOs, which enabled the sector to quickly get involved in helping those who needed it the most, especially in the hottest spots (Mariupol, Kherson, Kharkiv, etc.).

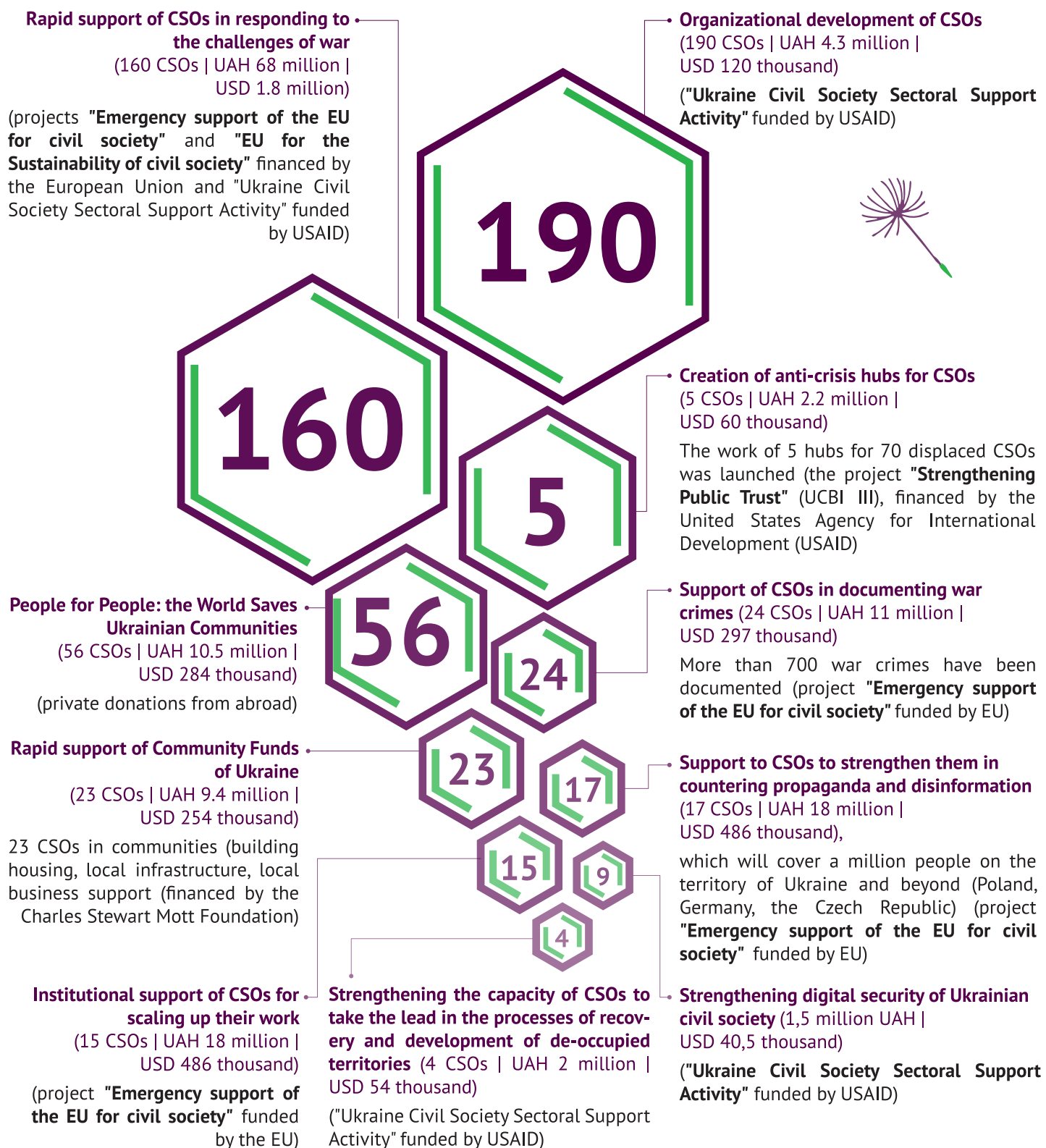
