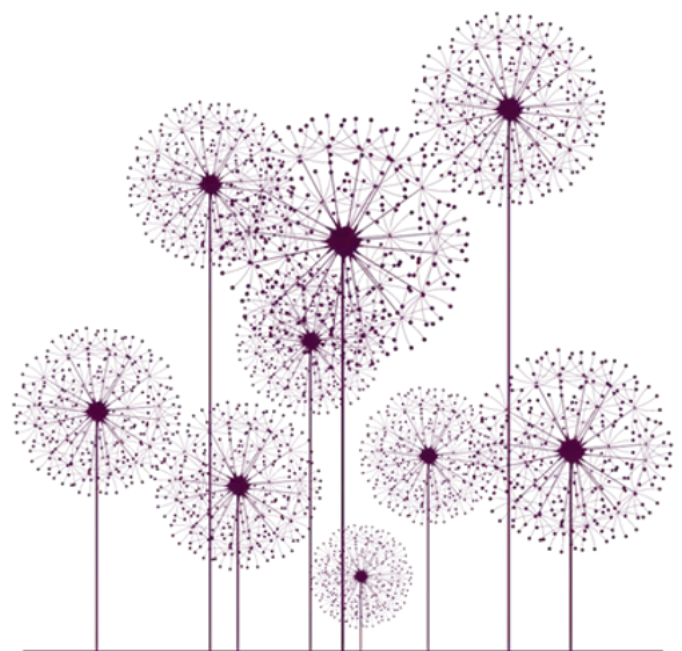

Voznesensk Community Foundation, Mykolaiv oblast **Project “Integration of IDP Women through Expanded Educational Opportunities and Business Development”**

The project responded to the growing economic vulnerability of internally displaced women in Voznesensk. Over 3,500 IDPs currently reside in the community, including more than 2,100 working-age women who lost employment due to displacement. Local research revealed high demand for short-term, practice-oriented non-formal education aligned with labor market needs, yet women faced significant barriers such as high costs, lack of mentorship, and limited local access to training.

Through the establishment and capacitating of the Adult Education Center, the project delivered vocational training courses on SMM, tailoring, barista skills, digital printing, and photography. In parallel, participants received entrepreneurship mentoring, individual consultations, and access to networking opportunities with employers seeking for staff. The initiative not only enhanced women's employability but also contributed to systemic change by supporting the development of a local Entrepreneurship Development Program for 2025–2027 funded by local authorities.

Berezan Community Foundation, Kyiv oblast Project “Public Activities for Community Development”

The project focused on restoring community infrastructure and strengthening youth-led initiatives in war-affected communities of Kyiv oblast. Following occupation and destruction in 2022, local medical, cultural, and educational spaces required urgent recovery to restore access to services and rebuild social cohesion.

Within the project, three rooms of a rural medical outpatient clinic in Rudnytske were renovated, a cultural space for children in Shevchenkove was refurbished, and a women’s community space in Morozivka was equipped. In parallel, the Foundation supported 13 youth-led social initiatives across schools in Berezan and Baryshivka communities, combining mental health support, creative development, environmental fundraising, and civic engagement. The project mobilized partnerships between civil society, local authorities, businesses, and youth groups, significantly increasing co-financing and strengthening local resilience.

Community Foundation of Kharkiv 'Toloka'

Project "Improving Educational Conditions through Renovation of a School Shelter", Chkalivsky Lyceum, Chuhuiv district, Kharkiv oblast

The project addressed urgent safety and educational needs in the frontline Chuhuiv district by renovating a school shelter in Chkalivsky Lyceum. Due to constant shelling and air raid alerts there is a need for a safe space for children to get together. However, the existing shelter did not meet minimum technical, sanitary, and safety standards, limiting children's ability to continue learning safely.

Within the project, a 153 m² shelter was fully renovated, including demolition and finishing works, waterproofing, insulation, electrical rewiring, emergency lighting installation, heating system setup, ventilation improvements, and antifungal treatment. The upgraded shelter now serves not only as a protective space during air raids but also as an environment for continued learning, extracurricular activities, and psychological support. The initiative strengthened cooperation between the Foundation, local authorities, and the education department, reinforcing institutional capacity to implement infrastructure projects under wartime conditions.

Zhytomyr Community Foundation Project “Installation of an Inclusive Sports Playground at Kindergarten No. 46”

The project addressed the urgent need to restore safe and inclusive child-friendly infrastructure in Zhytomyr amid wartime budgetary constraints. The outdated playground at Kindergarten No. 46 did not meet safety or accessibility standards, limiting physical activity and social inclusion – especially for children with special educational needs, internally displaced families, and children from military households.

Through international and local partnership, the Foundation installed a modern playground with shock-absorbing rubber flooring and inclusive sports equipment. The initiative combined international fundraising (Boot Development Foundation), local co-financing, and support from ISAR Ednannia’s “People to People” program. The new sports zone now serves as a daily space for physical activity, social interaction, and psychological recovery for children. The project also marked the Foundation’s first infrastructure case, strengthening its capacity to manage construction projects and multi-stakeholder partnerships.

Community Foundation “Podilska Hromada”, Vinnytsya Project “Your Childrens’ Space – 2”

The project responded to the growing emotional and psychological burden faced by children and families in Vinnytsya during wartime. The Vinnytsya Regional Children's Clinical Hospital, as a key medical institution in the region, has experienced an increased number of young patients affected by trauma, displacement, and stress. However, the hospital lacked child-friendly spaces for rest and psychological support.

Within the project, two dedicated spaces were created: a play-and-recreation room in the traumatology department and a psychological support room in the Mental Health Center. Over 40 units of furniture, play equipment, and art therapy materials were procured and installed. The initiative contributes to family-oriented healthcare by integrating emotional recovery into medical treatment, offering children and their parents a safe and supportive environment during hospitalization.

Community Foundation “Podilska Hromada”, Vinnytsya Project “Museum at School”

The project addressed growing educational disengagement and emotional exhaustion among students and teachers in wartime conditions. Constant air raid alerts, stress, and instability reduced concentration and motivation in schools, while traditional teaching methods became less effective. In response, the Foundation launched a competitive program to establish interactive school museums as innovative learning environments.

As a result, five interactive museum spaces were created across Vinnytsia schools: two Science Museums, a Medical Museum focused on first aid skills, a History Museum, and a Sustainable Development Goals Museum. Over 75 teachers and 70 actively engaged students contributed to the creation and launch of the spaces. The museums integrate hands-on experiments, STEM equipment, interactive boards, and real-life simulations, transforming schools into creative and practice-oriented learning hubs. The initiative strengthened collaboration between schools and the Foundation while reaching tens of thousands of community members through an extensive media campaign.

Community Foundation “Podilska Hromada”, Vinnytsya Project “Support for Rescuers”

The project responded to the urgent need to strengthen the operational capacity of the State Emergency Service of Ukraine (SES) in Vinnytsia oblast amid ongoing missile attacks and destruction of civilian infrastructure. Rescuers increasingly face operations in partially destroyed high-rise buildings and hard-to-reach spaces, where specialized climbing equipment is critical for safe and effective response.

Within the project, the Foundation procured and publicly transferred modern individual and group climbing gear to the Emergency Response Unit of SES. The equipment is actively used in emergency operations, improving both the safety of rescuers and the speed of access to victims trapped under debris or at height. The initiative also strengthened institutional partnerships: following the project, a Memorandum of Cooperation was signed between the Foundation and Vinnytsya regional SES department, reinforcing long-term collaboration on community safety.

Kharkiv Community Foundation ‘Toloka’ Project “Creative Space of Strength and Support ‘ToLoKa’”

The project aimed to restore and modernize a multifunctional creative space in Kharkiv, providing a safe and comfortable environment for community recovery during wartime. Amid ongoing shelling, social isolation, and emotional exhaustion, cultural and youth groups lacked stable and secure premises for rehearsals, meetings, and psychosocial support activities.

Through renovation works, zoning, and interior improvements, the Foundation transformed the premises into a fully operational community hub. The space now hosts children’s and youth music groups (KharkivMusicFest Orchestra and the “Vesnyani Holosy” choir), women’s psychosocial support groups, cultural screenings, and community events. Budget optimization enabled the purchase of additional seating, increasing the space’s capacity and strengthening its functionality. The initiative not only restored physical infrastructure but also rebuilt a sense of stability, belonging, and resilience within the community.

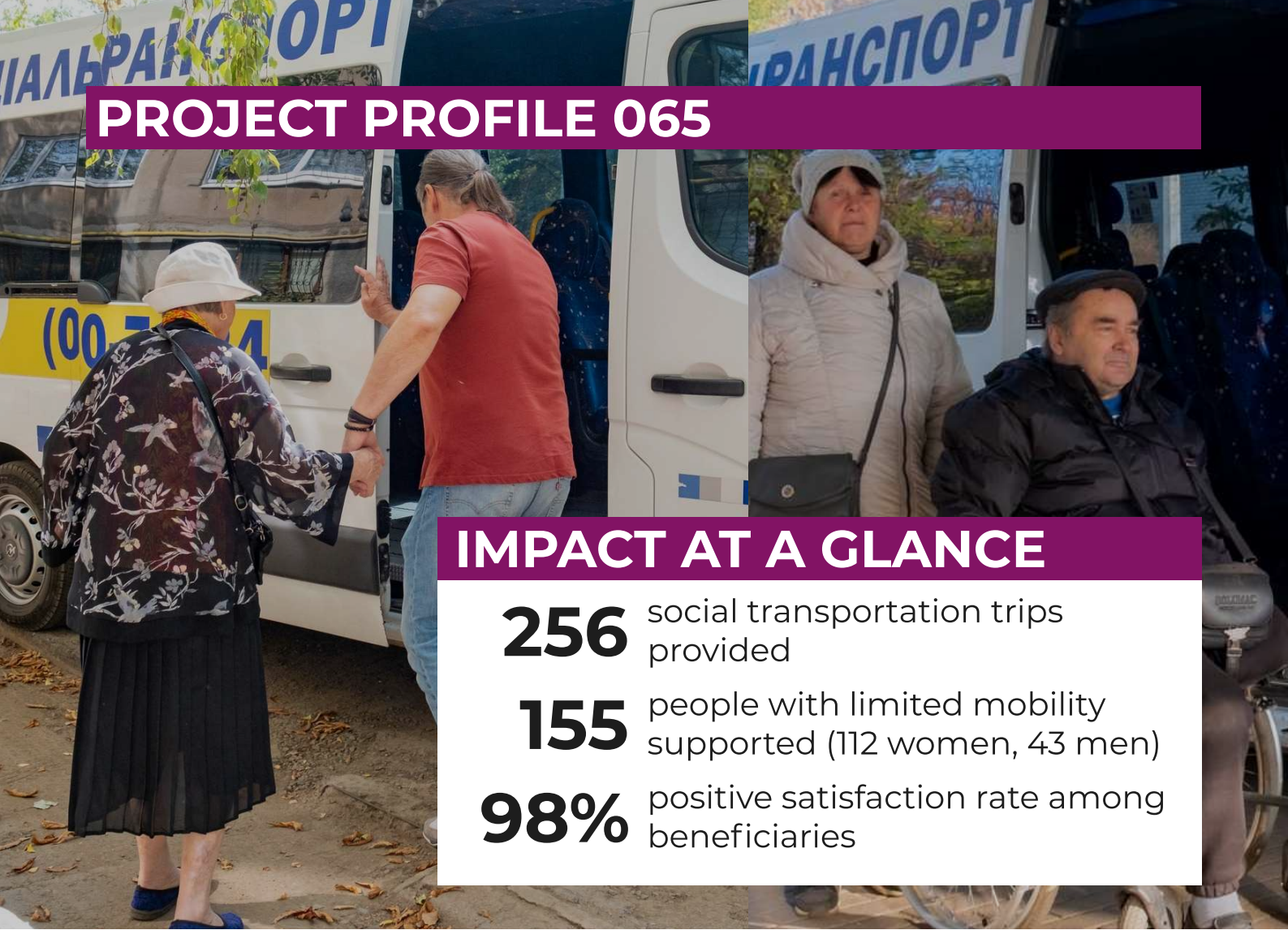

Charitable Organization “Community Foundation of Kherson ‘Zakhyst’” Project “Light to Frontline Ukrainian Kherson”

The project addressed one of the most critical needs of frontline Kherson – access to electricity amid constant shelling and infrastructure damage. Since the liberation of the city, power outages caused by targeted attacks on energy infrastructure have remained a daily reality, affecting residential neighborhoods and critical services.

Within the project, a 630 kVA street power transformer was manufactured, delivered from Khmelnytskyi oblast to Kherson, and transferred to the municipal enterprise “Khersonmisksvitlo” to replace equipment damaged by shelling in the city center. The initiative was implemented in cooperation with the Kherson City Military Administration and supported by fundraising efforts, including contributions from the Ukrainian diaspora in Germany. As a result, electricity supply was restored to multi-storey residential buildings in central Kherson, directly improving living conditions for civilians under constant threat.

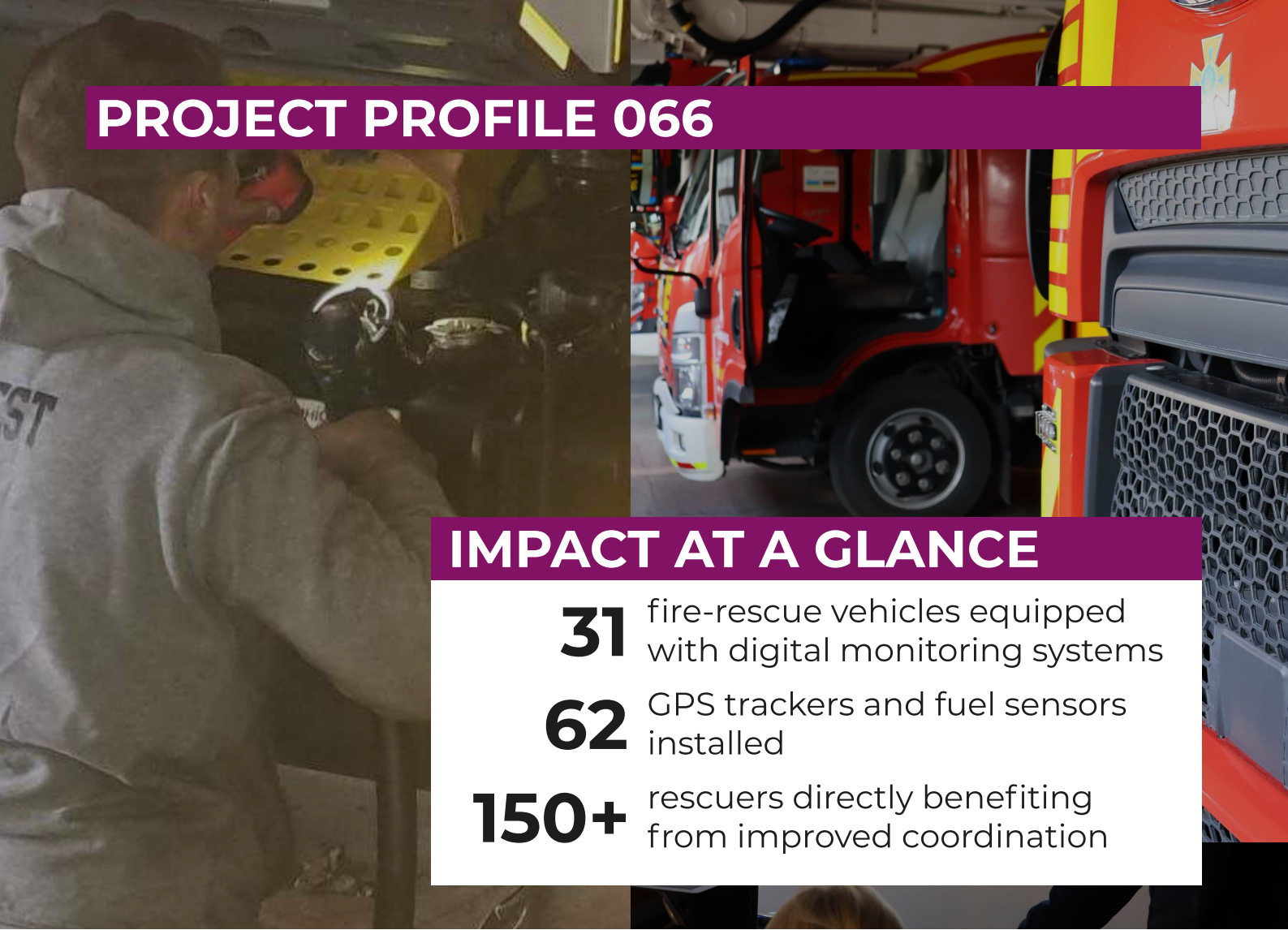

Community Development Fund, Kramatorsk, Donetsk oblast Project “Social Transportation Services for People with Limited Mobility in Kramatorsk”

The project addressed one of the most acute challenges in frontline Kramatorsk - access to essential medical, administrative, and humanitarian services for people with limited mobility. Following the full-scale invasion, the number of elderly residents, people with disabilities, and internally displaced persons significantly increased, while public transport and urban infrastructure remained largely inaccessible and unsafe.

Within the project, the organization established a structured and inclusive social transportation service operated by a specially equipped minibus. The service included a hotline, dispatcher coordination, route planning under frontline security conditions, and direct support from a social worker during transportation. The initiative exceeded planned targets and created a sustainable service model, strengthening both community trust and the organization’s institutional capacity in delivering specialized social services.

Community Foundation “Podilska Hromada”, Vinnytsya Project “Rescue Coordination”

The project aimed to introduce a transparent and technology-based fleet management system for the State Emergency Service of Ukraine (SES) in Vinnytsia oblast. In wartime conditions, the absence of real-time monitoring tools increases response time, limits coordination efficiency, and reduces safety for both rescuers and civilians.

Within the project, 31 fuel level sensors and 31 GPS fleet management trackers were procured, installed, and calibrated on 31 fire-rescue vehicles of the 1st State Fire and Rescue Unit of the SES. The system allows real-time vehicle tracking, fuel monitoring, route optimization, and better resource allocation during emergencies. The initiative marked the launch of the first comprehensive digital monitoring system for rescue vehicles in the region, strengthening operational efficiency and public safety.

Voznesensk Community Foundation, Mykolaiv oblast Project “BeSafe”

The project aimed to equip young people of Voznesensk with practical safety skills and strengthen their role in local decision-making processes during wartime. Facing ongoing security threats and limited youth participation in community governance, the initiative combined interactive learning formats with civic engagement tools.

Through simulations, quizzes, city quests, workshops, first-aid trainings, and a project management course, young people developed practical emergency response skills, identified local safety risks, and designed their own security initiatives. The project culminated in a public pitching event and the signing of a Memorandum of Cooperation between the Youth Bank Initiative and the City Council, institutionalizing youth participation in safety consultations.

“BeSafe” transformed safety education from passive lectures into hands-on civic action, fostering a new generation of informed and proactive youth leaders in the community.

Berezan Community Foundation, Kyiv oblast Project “Safe Space for Active Youth”

The project aimed to strengthen youth engagement and create a safe, accessible environment for civic, educational, and creative activities in Berezan. In wartime conditions, young people face limited opportunities for participation, increased psychosocial stress, and a lack of stable community spaces for self-development and peer interaction.

Within the project, the Foundation renovated and equipped a youth space designed for trainings, meetings, workshops, and community initiatives. The space is now regularly used by youth groups, initiative teams, and local organizations for educational events, volunteer coordination, and social activities. The initiative contributes to building an active and resilient youth community while strengthening cooperation between civil society and local authorities.

NGO “Hostynets”, Community Foundation of Novoyavorivsk, Lviv oblast Project “Embroidered Heritage: Women’s Craft Workshop”

The project aimed to support women in difficult life circumstances by combining sustaining local cultural traditions with economic empowerment. Since the beginning of the full-scale invasion, many women - including internally displaced persons, single mothers, wives of servicemen, and women with disabilities - have faced financial instability, social isolation, and loss of livelihood opportunities.

Within the project, a creative embroidery workshop was established as a safe and supportive space for learning traditional Yavoriv embroidery and developing income-generating skills. Thirty-nine women participated in the program, including 25 core participants and 14 additional trainees. The initiative included 15 training sessions in embroidery, 4 sessions on financial literacy and social entrepreneurship, a study visit to Lviv museums, and a public fundraiser. Participants produced over 60 embroidered shirts and dozens of additional handmade items, strengthening both personal resilience and the revival of local cultural heritage.

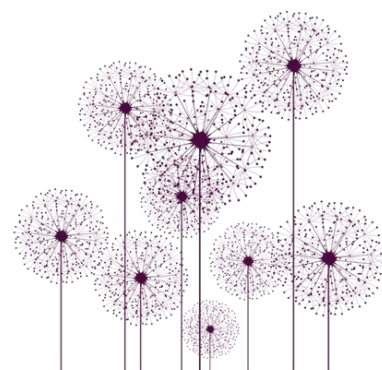

Community Foundation “Podilska Hromada”, Vinnytsya Project “Comfort in the Oncology Department of Vinnytsya Regional Children’s Hospital”

The project addressed the urgent psychosocial needs of children undergoing long-term oncological treatment and their families in Vinnytsya. In wartime conditions, medical institutions prioritize clinical care, while the creation of supportive, family-friendly spaces often remains underfunded. Children in the oncology department stay for 64 days during the first treatment protocol, with total hospitalization often lasting up to six months or more – turning the hospital into a temporary home for families.

Within the project, a fully equipped kitchen and family area were created, and the children's playroom was completely renovated. More than 30 units of equipment and furniture were procured and installed, and 30 care packages were distributed to young patients. The upgraded spaces now provide safe, comfortable areas for cooking, resting, and play, reducing stress for families and supporting a more family-oriented model of healthcare. Over 700 children and their families (approximately 1,400 people annually) can benefit from the improved environment.
